## Status of FFY2018 Federal Appropriations for IMLS and LSTA

In the House of Representatives, IMLS is included in HR 3354 at 2017 funding levels of \$231,000,000. The House approved initial passage of this bill on September 14, 2017.

In the Senate, the Senate Committee on Appropriations included IMLS at a slightly higher funding level than the House, \$235,000,000. The Committee passed Senate Report 115-150 on September 7, 2017. The full Senate is expected to consider this report by for initial passage later this year.

Next steps in the passage of a new federal budget include:

- Once initial passage occurs in both bodies, then a Joint Conference Report is created.
- Each body works with the other using Joint Conference report to come to final agreement and final passage.
- One or more Continuing Resolutions may be needed to fund the federal government until final passage occurs. While full IMLS funding looks promising for federal fiscal year 2018, please recognize the negotiations regarding the budget will be fluid and much can happen between now and then. Stay tuned.

### Update on 2016 grant cycles:

Our 2016 LSTA grantees are wrapping up their grant activities. The grant period ended on 8/18/17, with reimbursements and final reports due by 9/29/17.

We plan to create a grant opportunity for digital literacy through job seeker training for newly released prisoners, using remaining Imagine Academy tablets. Also meeting with Troy Goracke from the State Board about High School 21+ and Gale/Cengage's Career Online HS to see how these programs compare, particularly the online learning components. The goal is to see where libraries might play a role in helping patrons with the digital literacy component and putting a local face/support in place.

### 2017 Grant Cycles

We found two local experts, Ken Slavens from the Tacoma Astronomical Society (TAS), and Francisco Velez from the Evergreen Astrological Society, who were willing to wear a mic at the event, give running explanations, tips about viewing and safety, and answer questions on the fly. We made some coloring pages and word puzzles, special “WSL helped me survive the great solar eclipse” stickers, set up a tent and an outside projector, huge telescopes, and got some sidewalk chalk. <i>We didn’t</i> expect over 500 people to be waiting in line before we started distributing the glasses. People brought extra eclipse glasses and lawn chairs, everyone shared glasses and experiences, and the weather was sheer perfection. Now we’re collecting the glasses to send to Astronomers without Borders for the next big eclipse in South America – paying it forward.</p>

We use some of their visual reports available online so other libraries can learn from the sub-recipient’s experiences and also help them determine if a similar experience would be beneficial to their library. We continue working to publicize these grants so that more libraries will take advantage of them. We’re also working on ways to streamline the process while making the awards more cost effective.</p>

A wonderful partnership supported by the Eatonville Public Library, LSTA funds and a donation from the Larkin family of Eatonville.</p> <p>We’ve also just received over 22,000 raw files for Phase 1 of the Catholic Northwest Progress newspaper, a six year partnership between the Seattle Archdiocese, UW and WSL which will cover the Seattle based paper from 1900 through 1945. Eventually the paper covered topics in Spokane and across the state. We should see the earliest dates of this paper appear on our WDN website in mid-2018.</p> <p>Our big press release this summer was the announcement of the Hellenic Review newspaper, 1924-1936, based in Seattle.</p> <p>PDP accomplishment &amp; travel opportunity was my trip to Chicago to ALA &amp; meeting up with the Newspaper Interest Group to hear about other digitization projects across the country.</p>



	<p>A co-presentation on preservation best practices with the Shelton-based business, Small Town Papers, will be held in Olympia, at the Washington Newspaper Publishers Association in mid-October. Rural and mid-sized publishers are an important audience to reach to discuss their own preservation concerns and for WSL to provide resources to help them save their collections for future audiences and to build trust for future digitization projects.</p>
