## **2013 Digital Literacy Grants**

The purpose of this Digital Literacy grant cycle is to provide funding to public, academic, college, tribal, and school libraries to implement pilot projects that support Digital Literacy projects in the community.

Each grant project will meet at least one of the following objectives:

- Encourage the development of skills required to communicate and perform business transactions on a digital environment.
- Use diverse technologies appropriately to retrieve quality information.
- Support the development of skills to collaborate with other or to enhance employability in a digital and evolving world.

Total funds available: \$75,000.00 Individual award limit: \$7,500.00

**Title:** Digital Mobility at Garfield

Abstract: Garfield High School will set-up a demonstration cart of 10 iPads to use in the high school library and in selected classrooms to show how digital literacy can enhance the school environment. Garfield High School's librarian will collaborate with a middle school librarian in district. (The middle school librarian has already developed and built up a mobile lab program in conjunction with teachers in her school.) Once training and collaboration between librarians has been carried out, Garfield High School's librarian will work with pilot group of at least five teachers in content areas of social studies, language arts, science, math, and world language to integrate the use of iPads with their projects.

**Abstract:** *Getting Comfortable in the Digital World* will improve the digital literacy skills of community members by providing digital literacy classes at six regionally centered locations through Whitman County between March 1, 2014 and July 31, 2014. Whitman County Library will contract with experienced instructor(s) in basic digital literacy; partnering with the Community Colleges of Spokane to locate qualified instructors and with local agencies to promote the classes.

**Title:** Digital Literacy for the Spokane Valley

**Abstract:** Greenacres Elementary School will provide digital literacy education for families in the Spokane Valley with this grant project. Greenacres Elementary School, in conjunction with Spokane County Library District, will increase the number of parents and students effectively using digital tools to communicate, access information, and develop independent skills necessary to perpetuate life-long learning in the digital age.

**Abstract:** Asotin County Library will promote digital literacy by offering mediated drop-in sessions for people in need of digital literacy training by promoting the Microsoft IT Academy and Everyone On (particularly the jobs section). To accomplish this, Asotin County Library will purchase laptops and a charging/security station, hire a coach for drop-in sessions, and offer some specialized training such as web development workshops. Asotin County Library will partner with Rural Resources to encourage referrals to the digital literacy program, and will meet with Clarkston High School faculty to explore the creation of a sustainable digital literacy program for faculty, staff, and students.

These quality sources will then be passed through to students via the library and classrooms in order to develop their digital literacy skills.

Wahluke High School's intent is to use library resources to augment academic learning, develop professional skills, and teach community stewardship to students in the high school.
